




Dear Arctic Winter Games International Committee

A RESOLUTION OF THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH SCHOOL BOARD SUPPORTING SUBMITTAL OF A BID BY THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH TO HOST THE 2024 ARCTIC WINTER GAMES IN THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH.

**WHEREAS**, the Arctic Winter Games brings our circumpolar communities closer together by providing an opportunity for youth to interact and engage through sports competition and cultural exchanges; and

**WHEREAS**, the Arctic Winter Games will provide the Borough with the opportunity to showcase its local community and culture; and

WHEREAS, the Games support the sharing and exchange of cultural values amongst a diverse group of people; and

WHEREAS, the Games highlight the positive impact of sports, via friendly competition, on mental and physical health; and

**WHEREAS**, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough has not had the opportunity to host the Arctic Winter Games even though Alaskans have participated in each Games since its inception in 1970; and

**WHEREAS**, the 2024 Arctic Winter Games have been designated to be held in the State of Alaska and the opportunity to host may not come around for another 10-12 years; and

**WHEREAS**, the hosting of an internationally recognized event will create an influx of visitors during the off-peak season, thereby giving an economic boost to businesses within the Borough;

**WHEREAS**, the Games provide an opportunity to showcase the Borough's world class sports facilities, while also providing the opportunity to expand and improve those facilities for the benefit of the communities' residents and increased economic growth; and

**WHEREAS**, a bid to host the Arctic Winter Games, will include engagement of key community leaders, plans for the care, feeding and transportation of athletes from international contingents competing in multiple sporting activities, cultural activities, and opening and closing ceremonies, all of which will be attended by the public; and

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matanuska-Susitna Borough School Board supports the Matanuska-Susitna Borough bid being submitted to host the 2024 Arctic Winter Games and urges the citizenry to become actively engaged in this effort.

Cook Inlet Tribal Council (CITC) would like to express our support of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough's proposal to host the 2024 Arctic Winter Games.

CITC was created in 1983 to provide services to Alaska Native and American Indian residents of the Cook Inlet region, which encompasses the Matanuska-Susitna Borough, Municipality of Anchorage, and many nearby communities on the Kenai Peninsula. CITC has hosted the Native Youth Olympic (NYO) Games Alaska, compromised of 10 Native games events based on skills and values needed to survive Alaska's harsh environment, since 1972. We have seen firsthand the cross-cultural respect, cooperation, and interdependence the Games promote in communities throughout the state.

CITC and the Mat-Su Borough have a long history of partnership in service of our community. We operate satellite offices in Wasilla that deliver Recovery, Reentry, and Family services, and regularly collaborate with the two federally recognized tribes within the Mat-Su Borough to strengthen program and social services capacity for the region's tribal communities. The NYO Games enjoy widespread participation and support from the Mat-Su Borough community, with 17 teams and 265 athletes and 17 area schools competing in the 2019 Junior NYO Games and 31 athletes participating in the Senior NYO Games.

CITC is pleased to support the efforts of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough with this project proposal, and believe the Arctic Winter Games will be a conduit for partnership, community outreach, and networking throughout Alaska. We have confirmed support of the proposal from Chickaloon Village Traditional Council. Additionally, Eric Watson, CITC's Senior Manager of Tribal Relations, will support the Mat-Su Borough's bidding process to ensure effective coordination and information dissemination with our tribal partners in the region.

Hatcher Alpine Xperience (HAX) agrees to support the 2024 Arctic Winter Games for the alpine racing events. It should be noted that minimum standards have not been provided to HAX as of this time. It is the intent of HAX to do everything possible to meet the minimum alpine racing event requirements of the games when the standards become available.



# WELCOME TO THE MAT-SU BOROUGH COMMUNITY PROFILE



The Matanuska-Susitna Borough is conveniently located just 35 miles north of Anchorage. The Matanuska-Susitna Borough encompasses 23,000 square miles of Alaskan wilderness, with quaint communities that are as diverse as our geography and culture. Known collectively as the "Mat-Su Valley," the region is easily accessible from Anchorage, Alaska's largest city, yet maintains a small-town feel. Wasilla and Palmer are the two largest cities, located just 10 miles apart, and will serve as the central hub of the Arctic Winter Games.

#### **History and First Nations Influence**

The Mat-Su Valley's history is diverse. Dena'ina and Ahtna Athasbacan Native Alaskans settled in the Mat-Su Valley, relying on the vast waterways and elaborate trail systems to navigate the area and live a subsistence lifestyle. Millions of years ago, glaciers carved the region, resulting in two major valleys and countless rivers and streams. Today, those influences are felt throughout the region, and we honor those indigenous Alaskan's history and culture.

#### Modern History

Palmer's more recent history is rooted in agriculture. In 1935, under President Roosevelt's New Deal program, 205 farm families from the Midwest were relocated to the Palmer area, where they were given plots of land to homestead. Many of those families' descendants still call this area home. The "Matanuska Colony" was established. The fertile soil and long daylight hours are highly conducive to farming, and today, Palmer remains the agricultural hub of Alaska.



#### Modern history continued....

Wasilla's history can be traced back to the discovery of gold in the Knik and Willow areas. The town was established in 1917 when the Alaska Railroad was established, to serve as an outpost to gold miners seeking fortune. The discovery of gold in Hatcher Pass led to further development in Wasilla, and the town boomed. Today, it is the commerce center of the Mat-Su Valley.

Talkeetna, located an hour north of Wasilla, also was established as an outpost for miners and trappers using the Talkeetna, Susitna and Chulitna rivers for transportation. At the confluence of three major rivers and a stop on the Alaska Railroad, Talkeetna was the ideal location for bartering and trading. Today, tourism is its major industry, as visitors flock to the area for unspoiled views of Denali and the Alaska Range.

Sutton and Chickaloon, smaller communities located along the Glenn Highway National Scenic Byway, boomed as coal was discovered. Originally serviced by the Alaska Railroad, the highway was built in the 1940s during World War II.

#### **Local Government**

The Mat-Su Borough is the governing body for the entire region, with elected officials representing each area and a mayor overseeing the Mat-Su Borough Assembly. The cities of Wasilla, Palmer and Houston all have local governments, including city councils, a mayor and law enforcement powers.



#### Population

In 2019, the Mat-Su Borough had a population of 108,000. The region's population is one of the fastest growing in Alaska. Because of its ideal location just an hour north of Anchorage and its rural setting, many Alaskans choose to live in the Mat-Su Borough and commute to Anchorage for work.


Palmer and Wasilla are the most densely populated areas in the Mat-Su Borough, with a combined population of approximately 20,000 within city limits. Tens of thousands of people live near Wasilla and Palmer, but just outside of city limits.

#### **Time Zone**

The Mat-Su Borough is is located in the Alaska Standard Time Zone (AST), four hours behind Eastern Standard Time (EST), and makes adjustments for daylight savings time.

#### Climate

In March, the climate in the Mat-Su Valley is relatively moderate, with average highs around 32 degrees F (0 Celsius) and lows around 15 degrees F (-9.5 C). The area also has 12 hours of daylight

#### LODGING

There are approximately 655 rooms spanning hotels, motels and bed and breakfasts located in the immediate core area of Wasilla, Palmer and Big Lake. In total, there are 2,092 available beds throughout the Mat-Su Borough. Downtown Anchorage is 35 miles from the Mat-Su and has more than 17,000 rooms available if visitors want or need additional options.

#### RESTURANTS

The cities of Palmer and Wasilla, have numerous restaurants, ranging from national chain restaurants to locally-owned cafes. Restaurants cover virtually every national and international cuisine and range from fast food to fine dining. Delivery services are also available if visitors opt to dine in their hotel.

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

For air travel, the Mat-Su Borough is accessible via Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport, located 35 miles south of Palmer. Valley Transit provides public transportation between Anchorage and the Mat-Su Borough Monday through Saturdays. They also provide on-demand service throughout the Mat-Su Borough. Private options exist through numerous car and RV rental agencies in Anchorage.

#### SHOPPING AND ACTIVTIES

The cities of Palmer and Wasilla have a variety of shopping centers from large box stores that carry everything from housewares, to clothing, and food, to the smaller stores and boutiques for gifts and specialty items. There are many art galleries, brew pubs and coffee shops as well.

The Palmer Museum and Visitor Center provides visitor information in downtown Palmer, along with the Greater Palmer Chamber of Commerce. In Wasilla, the Greater Wasilla Chamber of Commerce provides visitor information. The Mat-Su Convention & Visitors Bureau assists visitors in all regions of the Mat-Su Borough, including Palmer and Wasilla.

In addition to all of our shopping and visitor attractions we have more than 500 miles of trail accessible from the Palmer and Wasilla that are groomed for walking, biking and skiing and a number of sporting good stores who rent fat tire bikes and skies.

# ANNUAL AND CULTURAL EVENTS



Communities throughout the Mat-Su Borough host large celebrations throughout the year. The largest event in Alaska, **the Alaska State Fair**, is held in Palmer every August and attracts 100,000 people over the course of 12 days. Also in Palmer, Colony Days and Colony Christmas are held in June and December and bring visitors from around Alaska.

For the past eleven years, Chickaloon Village Traditional Council, along with the Mat-Su Health Foundation, has hosted an **annual Tribal Celebration and Health Fair** drawing over 1,000 residents and visitors to the day long gathering filled with educational events, guest speakers, health screening, and cultural activities from beading to drumming and dancing.

Wasilla hosts an **annual Fourth of July celebration** with more than 10,000 attendees. On the first Sunday in March, the community of Willow hosts the annual **Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race Restart**, with visitors from around the world arriving to see the mushers and their dog teams off from the starting line, with 1,100 miles of trail ahead of them before finishing in Nome. Willow also hosts an **annual Winter Carnival**, which started 50 years ago and continues today. It is hosted over two weekends in January and February and includes one of the State's largest winter fireworks displays.

Winter sports are important to the Mat-Su Borough, with hosted events including the Alaska high school state **wrestling championships**, **state hockey championships**, large wrestling meets with schools from around Alaska participating and **regional basketball tournaments**. Numerous **Nordic ski meets** are held throughout the winter at the Government Peak Recreation Area.

The Mat-Su Borough is home to a rich arts scene as well, with the **Glenn Massay Theater** on the campus of Mat-Su College hosting theatrical productions, concerts and lectures. It is a state-of-the-art theater featuring the latest technologies. The Sheldon Community Arts Hangar in Talkeetna hosts arts and cultural events year-round. **Valley Performing Arts** is the local theater company, offering a run of six to eight state 21-012 productions each fall and winter.

# The Mat-Su Convention and Visitors Bureau (Mat-Su CVB)


As one of our key partners, the Mat-Su CVB has agreed to take the lead on the development of the Host Society. They understand the expectations of the Host Society and understand the requirements of forming a 501c3 in Alaska.

Once the Bid is accepted, the Mat-Su CVB will convene the Bid committee and the other key partners to draft, approve, and submit the nonprofit organizational documents including:

- Name, Mission, Vision, and Values
- Board of Director nominations including officers
- Articles of Incorporation
- Bylaws
- Internal Revenue Service form 1023-EZ / 501c3 application
- Register as an NGO with the State of Alaska, and
- Purchase MSB, City of Palmer, and Wasilla Business
   Licensees

Once the 501c3 incorporation documents have been submitted, the board will develop a three year strategic plan focused on actualizing the AWG Mat-Su Event utilizing the AWG staging manual as a guide.


### **Host Society Board and Staffing plan**

As discussed, Mat-Su Convention and Visitors Bureau and a few members of the Bid Committee, will work together to formalize the Host Society including all the incorporating documents to become a nonprofit 501c3 organization. It is likely that many of the Bid Committee members will transition to the Host Society Board. Additional Board members will be recruited from the Partner Organizations.


The Host Society Board of Directors, once the organization is formalized, will be responsible for governance, organizational policy, and the financial health of the organization. The Board of Directors will also oversee and chair committees within their purview and will be responsible for helping to recruit volunteers to serve on each of the committees. The Board of Directors will also elect officers and form an executive committee.

The Board Executive Committee will hire an AWG Executive Director. Once the ED is hired, they will work with the Board to develop a three year strategic plan focused on organizational capacity, fundraising, communications and outreach, and programs including sporting events, ceremonies, cultural experiences, and entertainment. The ED and Board of Directors will then hire a firm to develop the communications plan to recruit community support and to promote the event. As funding allows and timing requires, additional staff will be hired to support the ED and Board.




## SHARING AWG'S ACTIVITIES, EVENTS, AND OPPORTUNITIES WITH THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

With funding secured from the Mat-Su Borough, the Host Society will solicit and hire a communications professional to develop a communication plan detailing how communication will happen with the public and our partners throughout each stage of the Games.

The communications plan will provide messaging pillars and brand development, guidance on website content, social media content, earned media opportunities and a timeline for specific communications. The plan will be organized around planning and execution of the Games and will include the following topics:

- Branding and Marketing
- · Event and Games Planning
- · Volunteer Cultivation
- · Outreach and Community Engagement
- Fundraising
- Digital and Social Media



The Host Society will oversee volunteer recruitment, vetting, training, and recognition.

#### General Volunteers

As mentioned in our community engagement plan, the Host Society will develop a communications plan that includes a volunteer outreach component. The communications plan will outline all the ways we will recruit volunteers within each of the Games organizational sections including: Sporting, Food Service, Ceremonies, Information Technology, Marketing, Guest Services, Fundraising, and Athlete Care and Comfort.

The Host Society ED, will work with the Board of Directors to develop a volunteer acquisition and training plan that utilizes the staging manual as a guide assuring that we adhere to the background check requirements to ensure that all volunteers are appropriately vetted and placed.

#### Medical and Safety Volunteers

The Host Society ED, Care and Comfort Committee, and Volunteer Committee will work with the MSB Emergency Services Department, the Palmer and Wasilla Police Departments, to develop a plan to provide medical staff and volunteers at all the venues including athlete villages, evening events and ceremonies and each of the sporting events.





# FUNDRAISING AND SPONSORSHIP PLAN

Creating connections so that the whole community can support the Games



## Fundraising for the Games

The Bid committee recognizes the fundraising effort required to raise nearly 6 million dollars via grants, donations of cash and in-kind support, is no small effort. We have already secured a commitment from the Mat-Su Borough, the Fairbanks AWG Host Society, and the State of Alaska.

Filling the Fundraising Committee chair seat with a fundraising professional, fleshing out the fundraising committee team and drafting a fundraising plan will be one of the first priorities for the Host Society. The fundraising plan will identify funding goals, potential sponsors and sponsor levels, individual donors and donor levels, and in-kind support opportunities. The Plan will also include a matrix that outlines the number of sponsors in each category and give guidance to the fundraising committee about how to approach prospects.

We will solicit the support of our local utility companies, public relations professionals and the Palmer and Wasilla Chambers of Commerce to assist with developing the Plan and building relationships with local businesses who may be interested in sponsorship of the Games. The Fundraising committee will also develop a full sponsorship recognition plan that provides an appropriate public "Thank You" for all of the corporate sponsors who offer support.





## Grants and Appropriations


Securing federal, state, and private foundation grants and legislative appropriations will require a different approach. Once our sport facility assessment is complete we will have a better understanding of the facilities that need to be created and or upgraded.

Once these are identified, the committee can draft proposals and budgets for each project and begin to approach our funding partners to assess their interest.

The Bid committee recognizes that there may be legislative appropriations and federal Earmark funding available to support some of the facility development for the Games and to support special projects that would contribute to the legacy of hosting the games. Once the Host Society is formed, a sub-committee of the Fundraising committee will be formed to discuss opportunities with the Alaska congressional delegation and Mat-Su Legislators.

Mat-Su Health Foundation, the Rasmuson Foundation, and the Alaska Community Foundation are the top private foundations that have grant making programs in Mat-Su. The Mat-Su Borough Manager has already initiated conversations with these organizations to see if they could help with our Fundraising committee to develop our fundraising and sponsorship plan and offer grant support.







### Managing Expenses and Revenue

The Bid committee recognizes that planning and hosting the Games will require significant financial resources from the State of Alaska, the Mat-Su Borough, the cities and the private sector. The Host Society will work with staff from the Mat-Su Borough Finance department, the chair of the Sport committee and fundraising professionals from the community to develop a detailed Games Budget.

In December 2020, MSB Assembly allocated \$250,000 to support the Games. Once the Bid is approved, staff from the Planning and Recreation Services Department intend to issue a contract request to have all of our sport venues assessed using the technical manual requirements listed for each sport. We recognize there may be significant capital expenses to upgrade or create venues. For example, we may need to develop a biathlon range if a temporary one will not be sufficient. Knowing the facility upgrades that are necessary will help us develop a realistic budget and help us develop an appropriate fundraising plan.

The Bid committee has reviewed the budgets of previous Games provided by the AWG International Committee. The MSB 2024 Games budget reflects our cost estimate based on expenses listed from other communities and our expected revenue sources.

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

#### **MAT-SU BOROUGH**



### Alpine Skiing/ Freestyle Skiing @ Skeetawk

Skeetawk is the MSB's newest ski area located at the base of Hatcher Pass, part of the beautiful Talkeetna Mountain Range. In 2020, the first chair lift was put in with a run of 1,250 feet and has a vertical gain of about 300 feet, giving skiers access to about 30 skiable acres.



# Cross-Country Skiing @ Government Peak Recreation Area (GPRA)


The MSB is lucky to have the trails at GPRA which have been designed for competition. They are world-class and have a robust volunteer network of experienced groomers.

These two trail systems are adjacent to each other and encompass 22,685 acres. In the winter, there are hundreds of miles of trail utilized by snow machines, hikers, bikers and skiers. Almost all are typically marked with lath. This would be an excellent area to run loops or out and back courses of varying length.



#### **Local Technical Expert**

Utilizing the non-profit who runs the Iditarod Trial Invitational and has several local experts who have experience running operations and logistics for remote races, would be ideal. We also expect someone from the ultra sport community to serve as the technical expert of this committee and assist the Host Society in identifying appropriate officials.

# ATHLETE VILLAGES

School Use Assignments

# The Mat-Su School District

The Mat-Su School District is comprised of 47 schools. We have chosen five schools that are centrally located within the city of Palmer to serve as athlete villages.

As noted in the Hospitality Services section, hotels will be booked for Mission Staff, Officials and VIP's.

- Athletes, Cultural Teams, Coaches and Chaperones will be housed in one of five schools. With an estimated 2000 individuals staying in the Athlete Villages, with 11 per room, we will need about 182 classrooms. Palmer Jr., Palmer High and Colony High have a total of 200 rooms.
- Athletes and cultural representatives will be housed with their teams and chaperones will be assigned to each room.
- Room assignments will meet local fire and safety code, beds and bedding will be provided and rooms will be locked when unoccupied.
- Portable bathroom and shower facilities may be required to ensure every participant has access.



# Meal Plan for Athlete Villages

Mat-Su Borough School District Central Kitchen

Prepares and provides nearly 9,000 meals per day to support the student population nutritional needs in 47 different schools.

We are confident that the central kitchen will be able to prepare and provide the 2000 athlete, cultural representatives, coaches, chaperones and mission staff with three meals per day along with snacks and beverages between meals.

Once the Host Society is formed, our Care and Comfort Committee Chair, the Director of Nutrition Services for the school district, will work with the Mission Staff from each contingent to understand the dietary needs of the participants and develop a plan to provide appropriate meal services at each village.

Meals at each village will meet the Staging Manual Standards outlined in 6.3.1 and:

- All meals will be prepared to USDA nutritional requirements at the central kitchen and delivered to the athlete village kitchens to be served.
- Meals will be made fresh every day
- A special serving area at each village will accommodate those with dietary restrictions
- Healthy snacks will be available 24 hours per day
- Meals will be served between 6am-9am, from 11am -1pm and 6pm-9pm to accommodate event schedules

Food trucks will provide hot lunch at Game and Cultural venues

#### **Anchorage Internatioal Airport**

The Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport is a major airport in Alaska, located 5 miles (8 km) southwest of downtown Anchorage (ANC). The airport is named for Ted Stevens, a U.S. senator from Alaska in office from 1968 to 2009.


Roughly thirty-seven destinations are accessible from ANC via nonstop or direct flights, including destinations in 14 U.S. states and the countries of Canada, Germany, and Russia. U.S. mainline carriers operate a combination of year-round and seasonal service to the lower 48 states and Hawaii. Foreign carriers operate seasonal flights and seasonal charters to Canada, Asia, and Europe, the latter two sold as bundled services. Due to its proximity to Russia, Anchorage is the only U.S. city outside of New York, Los Angeles, Miami, and Washington D.C. to have non-stop flights to Russia, and is the only city to have flights to a city other than Moscow. For the majority of the Teams traveling to Alaska, flight services will likely be routed through Seattle-Tacoma.

#### Airport Facts-

- Nearly 5.7 million passengers served in 2019.
- Approximately 47 air carriers: 27 domestic and 18 international.21 passenger destinations served from ANC; Over 42,000 passenger aircraft landings and over 41,000 wide and narrow body cargo aircraft landings in 2019.
- 768 of airside runways, ramps, aprons, and taxiways, plus 196 acres of pavement maintained in support of general aviation facilities, parking lots, and roads.
- Three runways over 10,600 ft. Longest runway 12,400 ft. and
- It is open 24-7 and has never closed for a snow day

#### Welcome and Send Off

Through our partnership with Premier Alaska Tours, an Alaskan owned business that operates over 100 motor coaches throughout South Central Alaska and the interior, we will welcome, pick up, and drop off teams traveling to Alaska for the Games via Anchorage International Airport. In 2012, Premier Alaska Tours, provided all of the transportation for the Arctic Winter Games in Fairbanks and have also transported the Alaskan teams to Whitehorse in the past. The MSB has spoken to Premier Alaska Tours and they are interested in helping provide the transportation for the teams if the Games are held in the Mat-Su in 2024.



#### Transportation During Games Week

The Bid committee has developed a relationship with Premier Alaska Tours, the Mat-Su Borough School District, and First Student bus services. We have commitments from these partners to assist with transportation during the Games. The Host Society, Transportation Committee will work with Premier Alaska Tours and First Student to develop a daily schedule for shuttle bus service to and from all five athlete villages, to the each of the events, and back to the villages. We recognize the need for this to be well organized and timely and will do our best to ensure this aspect of the Games will run smoothly.

#### Shuttle Service for Visitors to the Events

The Bid Committee also intends for the Host Society to work with Valley Transit (our local public transit provider) to offer shuttle services throughout the Games week for visitors who want to attend an event, but parking limitations at some of the venues will necessitate shuttle service being offered.

#### VIP's, Special Guests, and Mission Staff

VIP's, Special Guests, and Mission staff will have the use of a rental car, Mat-Su Borough Fleet Vehicle, or a taxi/Uber to get to and from the various events and activities. The Host Society will work with the Transportation Committee to develop a form that the VIP's, Mission Staff, and Special Guests can use to select their preference and give us and idea of how many we will need to have available.





#### Medical Services in the Mat-Su

The Bid committee understands that providing medical services to the athletes, coaches, and chaperones while they are in our region is an important aspect of successfully hosting the Games.

To facilitate the coordination of medical services and trained medical staff and volunteers at each of the daily Games and events and to offer care during the off-hours while athletes are in their assigned village. The Host Society, Medical Committee will work with Mat-Su Health Foundation, Mat-Su Regional Hospital, and the Mat-Su Borough Emergency Services Department to develop a plan to provide first aid, and infirmary at one of the athlete villages, and access to emergency medical services 24 hours per day.

The Mat-Su Borough has all the medical facilities and ambulance services needed to provide a high level of medical care to a large number of athletes and spectators.



## Safety in the Athlete Villages and at each of the Games events

The Bid committee understands that providing security services and keeping the athletes, coaches and chaperones safe while they are in our region is an important aspect of successfully hosting the Games.

To facilitate the coordination of security services and ensuring that trained security volunteers are on site at at each of the daily Games and events and to offer care during the off-hours while athletes are in their assigned village, the Host Society, Medical Committee will work with the Mat-Su Borough Emergency Services Department and the Palmer and Wasilla Police Department to develop a plan to provide access to security services 24 hours per day.





## Clear Communication and Appropriate Technology

The Host Society will need to provide smart phones to all the Mission Staff, AWGIC, coaches, and chaperones for use during the Games. It must be easy for athletes and cultural representatives to communicate with each other and with family back home.

Event venue security staff must also have the ability to communicate with Host Society Staff and key Mission Staff during each event if there are any issues.

The Mat-Su Borough, the Mat-Su Borough School District, and the Cities of Palmer and Wasilla all have Wi-Fi available in their facilities and the Mat-Su Borough has access to additional laptops and mobile phones.

Once the Host committee is formed, staff from the Mat-Su Borough IT department, Emergency Services Department, and the Public Relations Department will work with the Director of IT and Communications to develop a plan to meet the requirements of the staging Manual 7.0. to ensure that adequate communication equipment and mobile devices are available at all the venues and facilities for all relevant staff and guests.



### OPENING CEREMONY

Menard Sports Center 2024 Arctic Winter Games

The Curtis D. Menard Memorial Sports Center will host the Opening and Closing Ceremonies for the Games.

The Menard Center is multi sport complex that is 102,000 square foot venue that can host up to 5,000 people.


The Opening Ceremony will be organized in accordance with the AWG staging manual allowing the appropriate dignitaries to be on stage and to give speeches that will be video broadcast.

The focus of the ceremony will be the March In Flag Ceremony with all the participating countries, territories, and states as described in the staging manual. Two entrance points will be used to ensure that there is a good flow to the March. Once all contingents are in the arena, the Emcee will proceed with the speeches, anthems, songs and the lighting of the Games Torch.

The participant oath and the officials oath will be recited and the AWG president will declare the Games open. The athletes will march outside for a fireworks display.

Once the ceremony festivities are over, the athletes will be shuttled back to their appropriate athlete village.

The focus of the ceremony will be the March In Flag Ceremony with all the participating countries, territories, and states as described in the staging manual.


The Host Society will organize special entertainment to celebrate the closing of the Games.

## Caring for Mission Staff, Officials and VIP's

The Bid Committee recognizes there will be mission staff, officials, and other special guests from each country attending the games to support their athletes and cultural representatives and to represent their governments. Though the Mat-Su Borough does not have any large, resort quality hotels, we have a number of small boutique hotels and vacation rental homes available that can accommodate these guests and their special needs. Once the Host Society is formed, the care and comfort committee, with support of the MSB Public Relations Director, will make contact with the participating teams to get a sense for the needs and expectations of the Mission staff, officials and other special guests from each country. Then the committee will design an appropriate lodging, transportation, and meal plan that will support them.

In addition, **Mission staff** from the participating countries will need office space during the Games, as well as a large conference room. At this time we intend on using the Palmer Depot, a historic train depot owned by the City of Palmer as the AWG office for the week of the Games. The space has seating and tables for 150 people, one smaller office space that will function as the Mat-Su Host Society Headquarters. There is also space for AWG merchandise and it has a large kitchen prep area that may be used to provide mission staff meals throughout the Games week. A large capacity photo copier will be rented for Mission staff to use and they will have access to the services of a local printing shop if needed.




