- Describe the project. The Matanuska-Susitna Borough (MSB) Level B Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT)
 Team, as part of the statewide response plan, needs to replace and upgrade essential equipment required
 to decontaminate responders and victims on-scene of a hazardous materials incident. This would include a
 portable inflatable decontamination tent and other required decontamination tools and equipment.
- 2. Explain how the project supports terrorism preparedness/response. The MSB HAZMAT Team responds to assist emergency responders with fuel spills, oil spills, and any other incident where there is a known or unknown hazardous substance. MSB HAZMAT Team must be self-sufficient to provide decontamination for members of their team, and capable of providing decontamination for known and unknown contaminants in a WMD Chem/Bio incident.

Alaskan communities play an important role in minimizing oil and hazardous substance spill impacts, and the MSB HAZMAT Team fulfill this requirement. DEC According to AS 46.04.20(e) and 46.09.020(e), the Commissioner shall enter into agreements with the Environmental Protection Agency, and may enter into agreements with other persons and municipalities in order to facilitate a coordinated and effective response to hazardous substance releases in the state. This new equipment would then be deployable under the State Mutual Aid Compact as needed.

This project provides critical infrastructure access and accessible transportation services for response priority objectives, including the evacuation of people and animals and the delivery of vital response equipment and

services into affected areas. The FSDS Unit increases capability during electrical grid shutdowns by providing fuel to generators and access to facilities. Over the past couple years, a large majority of the grid has been shut down/lost due to extreme weather winter storms.

Confined space rescue is a required discipline to ultimately have a technical rescue team and be capable of safely responding to various emergencies and disaster scenarios. Confined space rescue is a core required curriculum for urban search and rescue responses which are necessary in seismically active areas like Alaska. This project would pay to hire and host a training class in the Mat-Su Borough and pay for related expenses and training materials/supplies.

The MSB will utilize SHSP grant funding to support Confined Space Rescue Training for all rescue team members which span 8 fire service areas (FSA) within the borough to support preparedness/response to emerging threats and maintain CBRNE capabilities related to incident response. - 1. Describe the project. (Make sure to include what the project is, who the project is for, how the project will help the jurisdiction, quantity of items, etc.) This project would fund purchase of a mobile water distribution trailer unit that would connect to any available fire hydrant or other potable water source and provide a dispensing system of potable water to the public. Included in the project is a potable water bladder and 10,000 reusable 1-gallon water containers.
- 2. Explain how the project supports terrorism preparedness/response. Public utilities and infrastructure are frequent targets of terrorism events. There are three water systems located in the MatSu Borough that provide potable water and have fire hydrants. However, these systems only serve 20% of the population of the Borough. The remaining residents rely upon private wells. Recent disasters such as the windstorm of 2022, that disruption of the electrical grid (such as could occur during a terrorism event) prevented private wells from operating. The earthquake of 2018 caused wells to be contaminated for weeks with heavy silt. Stocks of bottled potable water were sold out withing hours. In 2022, the Borough in cooperation with the State of Alaska DOF, City of Palmer and National Guard distributed emergency water supplies and quickly exhausted available stocks. The water utility systems are capable of supplying the potable water supply needs of the borough residents. However, there is only one potable water container fill station for all three systems. The proposed equipment will provide a transportable fill site that can be supplied from any fire hydrant or other potable water source. Should a terrorist event impact one or more of the water systems, use of the water bladder and distribution equipment will provide an alternative to that community. The lack of potable water distribution equipment was identified during disaster logistics exercises held on June and September of 2023 and are included in the improvement plan.

Yes This gap was identified during the Disaster Logistics exercise held during June 2023 and September 2023. Please note Action item #2 in the June 15, 2023 After Action Report. This project will allow the Borough to deliver life essential hydration in support of impacted communities and survivors, until such time as the primary potable water systems can be restored. This project will support not only the borough residents but also the three cities that have their own water systems.

None of the three independent potable water supply facilities has budgeted to purchase this important equipment, however the Borough as a whole and all three communities would benefit from this equipment. The Last Mile Plan (Disaster Logistics) indicates that the borough will have to rely upon its own resources for 96 hours and in the case of water probably longer. This equipment will support that need.
