Ms. McKechnie spoke to the upcoming budget meetings.

Assemblymember Tew opined that it is fair to pay a Mayor \$100,000 and that the position is worthy of that pay rate.

Assemblymember Hale spoke in support of a raise for the mayor position. Spoke to the community clean up days that are organized in his district. Thanked the Manager and staff for the assistance in making them happen.

Assemblymember Sumner spoke in support of an increase for the mayor position. Noted that more duties could be added to the position. Stated that he wished someone would reconsider.

Assemblymember Nowers stated that she does not support an increase in the pay rate for the mayor position. Spoke in support of the many things that Mayor Halter does for his community. Spoke in support of Assemblymember McKee's position on economic development. Stated that she would like to have a discussion regarding economic development. Opined that the body needs to work on bringing more business to the Borough, which would bring more jobs for residents.

Assemblymember Yundt stated that he will be moving for reconsideration of the pay increase for the mayor position. Related that he misunderstood what was being voted on. Stated that the Borough has the greatest Mayor in all of Alaska. Stated that he would like to see someone paid well enough that it could be a full-time job that could push more economic development.

Assemblymember Boeve noted that on the Parks Highway from Mile Post 71 to 77 you can still see the devastation caused by the Sockeye Fire, even years later. Expressed her support and enthusiasm for the fire wise program.

Mayor Halter stated that he is confident that the direction the Borough is going is good one and that it will not matter who the next mayor is. Opined that work needs to be done in order to complete the rail spur and that would be a good project for the next Mayor to make happen. Stated that he is so pleased with the budget that he feels it could be adopted as is without any amendments. Noted that it is the best budget he has seen in all his years at the Borough. Reminded the body that if they do have any amendments to get them to the Clerk as soon as possible so that she can prepare them for the body. Commented that he is looking for the mill rate to be under 10.
