XII. MAYOR, ASSEMBLY, AND STAFF COMMENTS

Mr. Spiropoulos advised that state law does not prescribe how lake management plans are adopted and that the determination rests with the Assembly.

Assembly Bernier said a prayer.

Assemblymember Nowers noted that there was significant testimony regarding the library. Noted that the book distributed during audience testimony is not on the shelves in Borough libraries. Stated that she does not doubt the sincerity of those who challenge books. Opined that the current process appears to be spinning out of control. Noted that the Borough has expended substantial staff time attempting to address the concerns of those challenging books. Also noted that many community members who were previously satisfied are becoming unhappy due to increased scrutiny of libraries. Spoke in opposition to the disparaging remarks being made about staff. Stated that the aspersions being cast are unfair, as staff are unable to publicly defend themselves. Related that even Friends of the Library groups are experiencing harassment. Spoke to the need for all parties to remain respectful and civil. Spoke to the flooding occurring from Wasilla Creek. Noted that the affected subdivision is not old, having been constructed within the past 15 years. Spoke to concerns that the Borough allowed that construction. Stated that she would like additional data regarding current natural gas usage in relation to the AKLNG project and information on potential impacts to state funding for schools.

Mr. Brown advised that the estimated cost would be approximately \$8 million and added that the bill currently being drafted at the legislative level reportedly does not include that amount.

Assemblymember Sumner noted that the Borough does require a flood plain development permit.

Mr. Brown advised that he has received Governor Dunleavy's state fiscal plan. Noted that if the Assembly wishes to take a position on the plan, he will need their assistance. Stated that dates have been tentatively scheduled for travel to Juneau to meet with the State Delegation and that he needs to know which members are interested in attending. Advised that if more than three Assemblymembers wish to participate, two separate trips could be scheduled, and suggested February 24 through the 26, or March 3 through the 4.

Assemblymember Bowles stated that he appreciated the public testimony provided. Opined that a lot of what he heard tonight of those opposed to

Ordinance Serial No. 26-017 were negative towards Christianity. Noted that the book provided by Jackie Goforth was one she had contested and that it was subsequently removed from Borough libraries. Spoke in support of increasing education and awareness regarding how parents can monitor the materials their children check out from Borough libraries.

Assemblymember Gamble noted that his wife is a former librarian. Opined that the mudslinging is occurring on both sides of the library issue and expressed hope that all parties would conduct themselves in a mature and respectful manner. Stated that he is supportive of and enthusiastic about the AKLNG project. Spoke to planned construction at the NANA plant in Big Lake in support of the project. Noted that the project has the potential to bring significant revenue into the local economy.

Assemblymember Fonov noted that residents tend to organize effectively when issues of concern arise. Opined that the Assembly strives to serve the best interests of all residents. Stated that the body cannot always anticipate the level or nature of audience participation and that it is sometimes unexpected. Opined that lakefront properties require more thorough review and assessment. Spoke to his appreciation of the AKLNG project presentation. Advised that the book provided by Jackie Goforth was located in the Talkeetna Library. Stated that he would like to attend one of the Juneau trips scheduled for February.
