CALL TO ORDER at 6:37 pm, with Pledge of Allegiance, Chair Steve Edwards presiding.

ROLL CALL and QUORUM DETERMINATION: 11 of 16 RSAs represented. Quorum was met.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Approved as presented.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Minutes of November 15, 2018, approved as written.

TRAINING: None

STAFF REPORTS:

A. O&M: Terry Dolan: Gave synopsis of quake damage and Public Works response; 2 schools (in Palmer and Houston) shut down pending repair, road damage concentrated in RSAs 17, 27 and 21, roads quickly reopened with temporary repairs; crack edges milled level, subsidences backfilled, pavement re-placed where needed though the weather will limit its durability – expect higher maintenance and repairs during the spring thaw. FEMA may reimburse much of the cost but it will be a slow process; we're already doing the paperwork for long-term repairs.

The Assembly passed the roads CIP list. They also took \$3 million from the "dust control" reserve to cover quake damage; staff is now working on new legislation to hopefully retain a sufficient portion of

the \$3+ million remaining to allow continuance of the RSAs' road paving programs. Discussion followed regarding FEMA requirements and the earthquake response.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS:

A. TAB: Dan Elliott: At the last meeting Allen Kemplin (DOT) gave a presentation about the "Planning & Environmental Linkage" (PEL) program, designed to feed planning into the NEPA process and vice-versa. The TAB passed a Timber Transport Resolution following Alex Strawn's suggested text, and a Resolution suggesting the CIP process be coordinated with existing Development Plans.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

- A. Draft Resolution 18-05 re OR 18-093 (Timber Transport Code): Mike Shields presented the draft and Stephen Edwards moved to adopt; second by Dan Tucker. Brief discussion followed. The vote to adopt as written was unanimous.
- **B.** Influence of Resolution 18-03: Mike said Assemblyman Sykes today said it was not a priority item for the Assembly following the quake, and we may need a couple of more years of data to make any trend projection reasonably accurate, but it is not "dead" yet.

NEW BUSINESS:

A. Status of competition for the \$6 million "Dust Control Reserve Account" funds: Largely covered under Unfinished Business, item B. Both Palmer and Wasilla are trying to reinstate their cuts of the vehicle tax revenue that existed prior to "The Colver Ordinance". Brief discussion followed, with Terry clarifying that the available fund match is 25% for calcium, 50% for RAP and paving. Mike volunteered to draft a Resolution supporting the Public Works Ordinance for consideration at our January meeting; approved unanimously by the Board.

A RESOLUTION BY THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH LOCAL ROAD SERVICE AREA ADVISORY BOARD (LRSAAB) TO THE BOROUGH ASSEMBLY SUPPORTING PROPOSED ORDINANCE 19-013 RELATING TO THE "DUST CONTROL RESERVE ACCOUNT" FUND ALLOCATION

WHEREAS: This Reserve Account was originally established to provide a long term matchingfund source for the surfacing of Borough roads; and

WHEREAS: This account, which is itself funded by a portion of State vehicle licensing fees, has grown at a rate more than 4 times the original projection at its establishment; and

WHEREAS: To meet the current and projected Borough roads surfacing needs, as identified by the RSAs' CIP Lists, will require between \$2 and \$3 million in matching funds annually for at least the coming two decades, and probably longer; and

WHEREAS: It would be difficult for the Borough to handle more than that amount, both contractually and physically, in any one year; and

WHEREAS: This road surfacing is essential to protecting the taxpayers' investment in newly reconstructed and upgraded roads; now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: The LRSAAB strongly supports adoption of Ordinance 19-013 as presented, and described by IM 19-018.

LOCAL ROAD SERVICE AREA ADVISORY BOARD RESOLUTION 19-02

A RESOLUTION BY THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH LOCAL ROAD SERVICE AREA ADVISORY BOARD (LRSAAB) TO THE BOROUGH ASSEMBLY REGARDING EXCESSIVE DAMAGE TO BOROUGH ROADS DUE TO CONSTRUCTION UNDER MSB CODE 17.73 Multi-Family Developments

WHEREAS: MSB Operations and Maintenance bears responsibility for road repair and maintenance, funded in large part by resident taxpayers within the various Road Service Area, and

WHEREAS: For example, developments constructed under MSB 17.73 multi-family provisions at Blue Hills Overlook (RSA #27), Vince Estates (RSA #14), and Snowshoe Acres (RSA #14) increased average trips per day, including construction traffic, beyond that permitted by the maintenance life cycle for adjacent roads, resulting in damage which required additional effort and expense by O&M to rectify; and

WHEREAS: No mechanism exists to back-charge the developer for these additional expenses, nor to require the developer to make repairs; and

WHEREAS: The multi-family development code was originally established by the Assembly to ensure protection of life/safety issues and to protect the public health, safety and welfare, but subsequent experience has shown that these regulations fail to accomplish those goals; and

WHEREAS: MSB recognized this failure in Resolution 17-073, stating, in part, that Borough Code be updated to "Identify appropriate requirements to address, at a minimum, ADEC requirements on septic systems, substandard housing, drainage, off site traffic impacts, landscaping, adequate internal circulation for emergency vehicles and useable open space."; and

WHEREAS: A developer may subdivide parcels meant for use as single-family construction and develop them commercially with detached multi-family units, making them de facto Subdivisions; and

WHEREAS: MSB issues no land use permits and is hamstrung by lack of information about, or control over, land use; Now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: The LRSAAB strongly recommends that multi-family developments on such a scale be treated as Subdivisions and be required to undergo the platting process and be constructed to the standards specified in the MSB Subdivision Construction Manual to ensure that the total cost related to construction is borne by the developer without RSA taxpayer assistance.

VI. BOROUGH STAFF REPORTS

Mr. Leslie reported:

- The trail grooming grant applications were due September 14. Board was given a spreadsheet that spelled out who got how much.
- Mr. Phillips explained process of awarding grant money
- Most requests were granted
- Mr. Phillips invited the board's input on tourism infrastructure projects.
- Brett Ice Arena ribbon cutting will be held Thursday, September 27th at 6:00 pm.
- On September 18th, the Assembly approved the reallocation of money from trail bond projects to the Wasilla Pool project. The money that was moved was from projects that were either already complete or projects that were never going to happen, such as the Brasil Springs and the Wasilla Headwaters trail. The total amount reallocated was \$1.5 million.

- There is still \$150,000 left in the Wasilla Headwaters trail project for improvements on the Borough owned land.
- o It was reasoned that the money needed to be spent on a different bond project than not at all.
- o Mr. Lapiene disturbed by the way this came about. The topic never came up during the last board meeting. This did not come before the board. Why not?
- Mr. Phillips agreed with Mr. Lapiene about how the reallocation of these funds. Would like to know well ahead of time if this is to happen in the future.
- Ms. Bettine Agrees that it would be nice to have a heads up regarding moving money around. Feels that it would be appropriate for the board to make comment to the Assembly regarding bond money reallocation.

- 2. In accordance with Title 43.05.015(A), other southern access routes to proposed subdivisions may be viable (even if not easy) and supportive of the Borough LRTP. Such viability options and constructability have not been formally evaluated.

- 3. In accordance with Title 43.10.060(C), cul-de-sac do not meet the IFC access requirements.
- 4. In accordance with Title 43.10.060(C), access to Tex-Al from Borealis or Polar Lights need for safety and connectivity and reduce traffic.
- 5. In accordance with Title 43.05.015(A), this title is to promote the common good and welfare with regard to platting of subdivisions. There was overwhelming opposition to this platting action, addressing safety, and the well-being of residents surrounding the subject property. Better routes of access need to be considered, which will not cause undue burden on the surrounding residents.
- 6. In accordance with 43.10.060(C), The Platting authority shall approve an application after finding that the application conforms to the standards set forth in this title and other applicable statues and ordinances.
- 7. In accordance with 43.10.060(C), the proposed subdivision is not consistent with the intent of the LRTP and the OSHP. The desired north-south connection was erroneously proposed to travel through a residential standard road, connecting New Hope to Tex-Al. Trinity View's roads have many driveways directly accessing these roads directly, and they cannot support this connectivity.

WHEREAS, a local match of 9.03% is required to receive FTA 5311 and FTA 5339 funding, with up to \$341,334 from the Mat-Su Borough and up to \$3,438,666 granted by the Alaska Community Transit Office; and

WHEREAS, Valley Transit provides over 50,000 annual commuter rides to Mat-Su Borough Residents; and

WHEREAS, Valley Transit's commuter buses were purchased from Anchorage's People Mover already past their useful life, and the commuter buses average 850,000 miles and need to be replaced; and

WHEREAS, the 2035 MSB Long Range Transportation Plan and the 2018 Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan recognize the increasing need to prioritize investment in transit services in the Borough; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Matanuska-Susitna Borough Transportation Advisory Board hereby recommends Assembly appropriation of \$341,224 from the Community Transportation Program Grant Match budget to provide the required 9.03% local match for federal transit grants to replace Valley Transit commuter buses. If the grant award from the Alaska Community Transit Office is less than \$3,438,666, any unused match funding will remain in the Community Transportation Program Grant Match budget.
