STAFF REPORTS:

A. O&M: Terry Dolan: Presented project update sheets. No construction started yet. Weight restrictions on Borough roads in effect March 25th for core area and March 27th for Northern area. Earthquake damage assessment, with snow gone, is more visible, and the list is growing. Contracts out to group repair work areas, specifically Point Mackenzie and Big Lake areas.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS:

A. TAB: Dan Elliott: Met February 26, 2019. Passed a resolution that future subdivisions approved through Platting will include Adequate Right of Way for pedestrian pathways and this will be included in the Subdivision Construction Manual. John Harris clarified that this resolution was discussed

A RESOLUTION OF THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMISSION RECOMMENDING ASSEMBLY ADOPTION OF THE ASSET MANAGEMENT PLAN: NATURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT UNITS, ITS LAND USE DESIGNATIONS AND CLASSIFICATIONS; AMENDING MSB 15.24.030, REPEALING THE SUSITNA AREA PLAN; AND REPEALING THE FISH CREEK MANAGEMENT PLAN.

WHEREAS, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough Assembly adopted Ordinance Serial No. 10-083 adopting the Natural Resource Management Unit Plan, contained within MSB 15.24.030 Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the borough has implemented the Plan for over eight years and has identified a number of updates to make the Plan more effective; and

WHEREAS, the Plan contains goals and guidelines for agriculture and grazing, buffers, cultural resources and historical sites, fish and wildlife habitat, forestry, green infrastructure, private property, public recreation and tourism, materials (rock, sand, and gravel), settlement, special management zones, trails, transportation, water quality and quantity, wetlands and riparian resources; and

WHEREAS, the Plan update identifies the many and varied uses and values of lands within Natural Resource Management Units, and provides current land-use designations and management guidance which, if properly implemented, will maintain the health and

sustainability of borough forests while providing local and high value-added use of forest resources, protect watersheds and water quality, maintain habitat necessary to support health and diverse fish and wildlife populations; all of which are central to sustaining the quality of life and lifestyles of the borough communities, ensuring that a broad spectrum of outdoor recreational opportunities continue to be available, and supporting recreation and tourist based businesses; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to MSB 23.20.060 the Plan contains a balanced approach to address the requirements the adopted Forest Management Plan, which manages borough forests in a way that provides for a level of timber harvest with the ability to meet reasonable local and industry needs while maintaining or enhancing the overall health of the borough-owned forests; and

WHEREAS, the Plan update incorporates the Fish Creek Unit and replaces the Fish Creek Management Plan; and

WHEREAS, the NRMU Plan is the Borough's land management plan and fulfils the state requirement relieving the borough of the need to include the State Susitna Area plan in MSB 15.24.030.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Matanuska-Susitna Borough FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMISSION supports the management intent, land use designations, and land use classifications for the borough-owned land covered by the Asset Management Plan: Natural Resource Management Units.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMISSION supports the adoption of the updated Asset Management Plan: Natural Resources Management Units.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough FISH AND WILDLIFE COMMISSION supports amending MSB 15.24.030 to reflect adoption of the Plan update, repeal of the Susitna Area Plan, and repeal of the Fish Creek Management Plan.

WHEREAS, the Matanuska-Susitna Fish and Wildlife Commission was created in February 2007 to represent the interests of the borough in the conservation and allocation of fish, wildlife, and habitat; and

WHEREAS, salmonid fish populations using Matanuska-Susitna Borough rivers and streams have seriously declined over the past 30 years; and

WHEREAS, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough contains 8 of the 16 salmon stocks of concern as of April 2019 for the state of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough Fish and Wildlife Commission has made positive strides in directing funds to local fisheries research and fish passage projects while encouraging stakeholder groups to prioritize fishery needs in Upper Cook Inlet and its critical watersheds; and

WHEREAS, the Fish and Wildlife Commission has successfully worked with the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and the Alaska Board of Fisheries to improve salmon returns for the Matanuska-Susitna Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Commission continues to support robust opportunities for sport, subsistence, and personal use fisheries in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough and recognizes the importance of restoring historic health to threatened fisheries and the associated wetlands that remain critical for supporting salmon populations; and

WHEREAS, the Fish and Wildlife Commission recognizes the need for new development that may sometimes impact wetlands while supporting the concept of avoiding, minimizing, and mitigating these impacts; and

WHEREAS, some major developments that require wetland protection or mitigation may not be fully addressed by other agencies and regulatory bodies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Matanuska-Susitna Fish and Wildlife Commission supports the concept that the Matanuska-Susitna Borough provide for supplemental wetland mitigation in addition to what other agencies and regulatory bodies may require in order to both protect and enhance the salmonid populations as the Matanuska-Susitna Borough continues to grow.

- noted that without land use regulations, the Commission is left to make decisions for the community; and
- stated her appreciation for the Planning Departments hard work and ensuring that everything runs smoothly.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MATANUSKA-SUSITNA BOROUGH PLANNING COMMISSION APPROVING A MODIFICATION OF A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FOR THE EXPANSION OF A MARIJUANA CULTIVATION FACILITY AT 6570 WEST TREVETT CIRCLE, SUITE C, TAX ID# 17N02W10A015; LOCATED WITHIN TOWNSHIP 17 NORTH, RANGE 2 WEST, SECTION 10, SEWARD MERIDIAN.

WHEREAS, an application has been received from Kerby Coman, on behalf of Alaska Frontier Cannabis, requesting the modification of a conditional use permit for the expansion of an existing marijuana cultivation facility at 6570 West Trevett Circle, Suite C, Tax ID# 17N02W10A015; located within Township 17 North, Range 2 West, Section 10, Seward Meridian; and

WHEREAS, MSB 17.60.040 allows a property owner to apply for a modification of a conditional use permit; and

WHEREAS, unless this type of use is maintained under and in accordance with a lawfully issued permit, marijuana cultivation facilities are declared to be a public nuisance; and

WHEREAS, access is made onto West Trevett Circle via an existing Borough approved driveway over 700 feet long; and

WHEREAS, the proposed use is set back approximately 530 feet from the West Trevett Circle right-of-way to the north, 100.8 feet from the east lot line, 110 feet from the south lot line, and 120 WHEREAS, the Parks Highway right-of-way abuts the subject parcel to the north. Two large undeveloped parcels, approximately seven and ten acres in size, abut the parcel to the east. Several one-acre lots developed with residential uses abut the parcel to the south. Three large parcels, with residential and industrial uses, abut to the west and range from three to seven acres in size; and

WHEREAS, other developed properties in the area which have highway frontage are all industrial or commercial uses, with the exception of one residential home; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, the proposed use has a security plan in place, which includes education of employees on all security measures; and

WHEREAS, according to the security plan, a combination of cameras, motion detectors, and lighting will be used to secure the site and monitor all activities at the facility; and

WHEREAS, the proposed lighting will be downward directional and shielded to prevent light from spilling off of the subject parcel; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, all cultivation and processing will take within the proposed structures; and

WHEREAS, the facility will not be open to the general public; and

WEHREAS, the proposed expansion includes the construction of five greenhouses, each being 90 feet wide and 96 feet long, and the placement of 10 connex structures, each being eight feet wide and 40 feet long; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, no business signs will be located at the site or visible from off site; and

WHEREAS, the closest school (American Charter Academy) is approximately 3,000 feet away from the proposed use; and

WHEREAS, consumption of marijuana is prohibited at the site; and

WHEREAS, persons under the age of 21 are prohibited from entering the premises of the proposed use; and

WHEREAS, after proper notification to the State of Alaska Alcohol & Marijuana Control Office; all marijuana products deemed unusable will be mixed with other waste material, sealed in a container, and disposed of at the Borough landfill; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, wastewater will be kept in storage tanks and a third party contractor will remove and dispose of the wastewater at a legally permitted wastewater facility; and

WHEREAS, a six-foot tall chain link fence has been constructed around the property, along with a locking gate across the driveway; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, a six-foot tall screening fence is to be constructed to encompass the existing facility and the proposed expansion as shown on the site plan; and

WHEREAS, all of the required site plans and operational information have been provided by the applicant; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, carbon filters will be used in all of the proposed structures to prevent cannabis odors from escaping the subject property; and

WHEREAS, no new landscaping or berms are planned or required by code; and

WHEREAS, the subject parcel is approximately 12.42 acres in size; and

WHEREAS, the closest residential structure is located to the west and is approximately 150 feet away from the proposed expansion; and

WHEREAS, Alaska Frontier Cannabis has obtained marijuana establishment license #14396, in accordance with 3AAC 306.005; and

WHEREAS, a copy of marijuana establishment license #14396 has be provided to the Borough; and

WHEREAS, on May 3, 2019, the State of Alaska Marijuana Control Board approved the expansion request made by Alaska Frontier Cannabis; and

WHEREAS, the State Fire Marshal Office has issued Full Plan Review #2019Anch1055, for the proposed expansion; and

WHEREAS, the applicant has provided a copy of the approved Full Plan Review #2019Anch1055; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, nutrients, cleaning supplies, and pesticides will be stored within the facility according to each manufacturer's recommendations; and

WHEREAS, according to the application material, all hazardous material will be stored, handled, and disposed of in accordance with the safety data sheet for each item; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has reviewed this application with respect to standards set forth in MSB 17.60.100, 17.60.150 and 17.60.160; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission conducted a public hearing on May 20, 2019 on this matter.

- 10. The applicant has provided documentation demonstrating the proposed use is in full compliance with all applicable fire code (MSB 17.60.150(D)(2)).
- 11. The wastewater and waste material disposal plan demonstrates compliance with the Alaska State Department of Environmental Conservation (MSB 17.60.160(A)).

- The odor mitigation plan demonstrates mitigation 12. measures will prevent odors from materially impacting adjoining properties (MSB 17.60.160(B)).
